Making sure Yorkshire's massive network of roads stays open, even in the depths of winter, involves lots of planning and hard work. **Ruby Kitchen** reports – and finds that there's no 'magic dust' to get the job done.

# 'Keeping roads clear involves lots of planning'

THERE'S NO 'magic dust', say those in charge, to keep North Yorkshire's roads clear. It's a system of preparing of stockpiling and navigating, and of always watching the weather.

There are a great many roads in England's biggest county - about 5500 miles' worth. Some deeply rural, others rarely used. But they form a lifeline to those who do.

Keeping them clear is a priority, says Mike Roberts, head of highways operations at the county council. There is a statutory duty, but also a social responsibility. It's a system of meticulous planning amid uncertain wintry weather. And, with a network of farmers and contractors, of leaning on those who can go where the gritters cannot.

Clearly, it's impossible for any highway authority to clear and treat every road," he said. "We are dispersing salt, and pushing snow out of the way with ploughs.

"But it's not magic dust - we can't ensure that snow won't land again. We can't get to every door, but we can try and get near so that people can access a network. decrease in services we provide." #### Maintenance 'top priority'

WINTER MAINTENANCE in North Yorkshire is a "top priority" for the area, the authority has stressed.

The number of gritters has fallen from 93 in 2010 to 86, as a result of "operational efficiencies" which it says have not affected the network. The number and contractors used has also fallen, from 130 to 111, grit bins and grit heaps have reduced from 10,000 to 8,000.

The authority has stressed that dealing with winter conditions is a complex operation, but is a "top priority" and it is well prepared. Winter partnership schemes are run with parish councils to bring together volunteers to clear snow and treat roads and footpaths.

There have been times, he said, when the snow's been so bad he cannot see his bonnet. He once spent a day on the top near Whitby, not knowing his colleague was stuck in the snow just metres away. Another time he helped three children and their frantic mother after the youngsters locked themselves in their car.

In his 41 years on the roads he's seen some changes, though. Contractors like himself can no longer come to the rescue of motorists stuck in the snow, as insurance protocols stand in the way. There was a "frustrating" time, he recalls, when gritters were wound by hand, but with the advent of technology they are now super efficient and speedy.

One of the biggest changes, he said, has been around decisions over when contractors could work. The rules are much stricter now, he said, and decisions aren't taken so lightly. But it's a "tightening up" of the system to become Among the changes are new more efficient, he believes, rath-

gritting policy is shambolic', says MP

#### CALDERDALE

A FAILED bid to bring in a new winter gritting policy across Calderdale created "absolute chaos", the area's MP has said as he questioned the competence of the authority's leadership.

Calderdale Council had trialled a new scheme late last year, reassessing its priority routes to ensure gritting was "only carried out where it was needed most".

But it came under intense criticism after a cold spell hit in December, triggering a wave of complaints and resulting in the authority backtracking to its previous policy.

Now Calderdale MP Craig Whittaker has criticised the authority's handling of the situation as "shambolic".

"Calderdale Council's gritting policy has been is absolute chaos this winter and their handling of implementing a new policy has been shambolic," he said. "The council's handling of this situation compromised the risk of residents, damaged the reputation of the council and demonstrated a lack of competent leadership at the council."

Coun Barry Collins, Calderdale Council's cabinet member for regeneration and economic development, said: "Our priority is to keep Calderdale safe and moving throughout wintry weather and to have a fair approach across the area, which is affordable and resilient in the long-term."

# Authority says roads are less prone to ice because of their lower altitude

GEOGRAPHY PLAYS a part, Leeds City Council has said, arguing its roads are less prone to icing up than those at a higher elevation above sea level.

The authority, which routinely grits 43 per cent of its network on a priority basis, has maintained its budgets of £1,36m since 2015.

It has the same number of gritters as in 2010, clears the same number of routes and has steadily increased the number of gritbins it offers to residents. And its network is flatter and lower than neighbouring regions, the authority has stressed, with roads in higher areas experiencing temperatures 1-2 degrees colder.

"Our priority is to keep Leeds moving safely, and our gritters have a 3,000km-long network of road to cover, focusing on 1,280km of primary network," a spokeswoman for the city council said.

"In Leeds we've kept our winter maintenance budget at the same level for the past decade. However, additional resources are available if more grit is needed due to extreme or extended cold spells."

City councillor Coun Barry Anderson said: "Leeds is a challenging city in terms of its area and road network so within the resources the council allocates for gritting they do an effective job.

"Could more of a focus be put on pavements to assist local residents and particularly older people?"

Thank you for bearing with us this week. Cancelling bin collections is a very difficult decision to make, but we have to consider the safety of both our staff and residents.





# Website had its busiest day


#### Website users per day








#### Chance of snow January 16 - 17



### **The North Atlantic Oscillation**







# A Grit bin doing it's job



### Winter 2018-2019

- Winter 2018/19 indicators
- Last winter was close to average overall but there were large variations during the three month period. Many parts of the UK saw more snow than they had for several years. Will that trend continue during the coming winter?
- Seasonal models
- At this early stage there isn't a clear picture from the long range computer models. Publicly available data from the UK Met Office GloSea model goes out to the end of December and it favours above average aggregate temperatures over the October, November and December period. The ECMWF and Meteo France seasonal models show a similar outlook.
- The American Climate Forecast System (check the latest <u>CFS v2</u> <u>charts on TWO</u>) v2 is updated regularly but recent runs have suggested a mild winter.
