





Introduction to GMCA Waste & Resources



- Staff, resources, liabilities and statutory responsibilities of former GM Waste Disposal Authority transferred to GMCA on 1st April 2018
- Largest joint waste disposal authority
- 1.1 million tonnes of waste per annum from 9 of the 10 districts of GM
- 2.2 million inhabitants
- 35 facilities across 20 locations
- 2 contracts with SUEZ for term of 7 years plus 3 years which commenced June 2019 after 18-month procurement process



The SUEZ Contracts

- Contracts commenced June 2019, 7
 + 3 term, extension already priced
- Increase in landfill diversion to at least 98% (PFI contract was 90%)
- Increase in HWRC recycling after 4 years to 60% (PFI contract was c.40%)
- Trade waste control measures at HWRCs
- Recycling of new commodities carpets/mattresses/street sweepings
- Social value benefits



Procurement Goals

- Generate market interest and overcome perception
- Deliver operational savings
- Improve performance particularly at HWRCs
- Optimise use of assets and overcome legacy performance issues
- Minimise export of materials and support development of Circular Economy
- Continue process of behavioural change and community engagement
- Deliver a solution that maximised the benefit for Greater Manchester through social value





GMCA Social Value Policy Outcomes

- Outcome 1: More local people in work
- Outcome 2: Thriving local businesses
- Outcome 3: Responsible businesses that do their bit for the local community
- Outcome 4: A local workforce which is fairly paid and positively supported by employers
- Outcome 5: Individuals and communities enabled and supported to help themselves
- Outcome 6: An effective and resilient third sector
- Outcome 7: A reduction in poverty, health and education inequalities
- Outcome 8: Acute problems are avoided, and costs are reduced by investing in prevention
- Outcome 9: We are protecting our physical environment and contributing to climate change reduction
- 15% of overall score available for the social value response, no guidance or preferences were provided, open to bidders to respond.

- 54 individual commitments linked to the performance framework
- Benefit measured each contract year using Social Profit Calculator Ltd

Social Value Plan Highlights

Outcome 2: thriving local businesses

- Support the local economy by spending 60% of total expenditure within GM boundary
- 60% of supply chain spend on SMEs, social enterprises micro businesses and 3rd sector organisations
- Securing local outlets for materials SAICA
- TFR Group repurpose existing facility as a mattress recycling facility





Social Value Plan Highlights

Outcome 3: responsible businesses that do their bit

- Real Living Wage
- Apprenticeships/training/student placements
- Contract with Recycling Lives for processing of scrap metal from HWRCs
- Styal Prison partnership training while on Release on Temporary Leave

Outcome 6: An effective and resilient 3rd sector

- Develop reuse hub to divert waste from disposal and feed reuse shops
- £220k pa from Reuse shops to support Community Fund
- £100k pa donation for GM Mayors Fund

Outcome 9: protection of our physical environment and contributing to climate change reduction

- No more than 2% of waste to landfill
- Optimising the efficiency of existing process plant to maximise throughput, efficiency and landfill diversion
- Carbon offset through tree planting
- Installation of electric car charging points
- Investigating conversion of fleet to hydrogen, LED lighting, changes to OC systems





Trafford Park's Renew Hub takes in pre-loved items that would otherwise have ended up in the tip and fixes them up to be sold. 🝰





"What we want is for these items to go into good hands, we believe in what were trying to achieve here"








