Christmas Past 2017 /18

- Excessive amounts of plastic flowers and decorations and Christmas lights placed on graves
- Wreaths are left to rot as few families remove them in new year
- At least 40 work hours in organised clearance by team in February
- Christmas waste, filling 5 flat bed lorry loads, sent to landfill
- Customer complaints for and against removal

- Its distracting, disrespectful to other mourners and in poor taste
- I actually find it offensive that people cover the graves in this way
- Must admit it's a bit OTT
- There are strict rules governing memorial stones in cemeteries to ensure no OTT memorials



Sustainable living

Wild flowers in the Cemetery are important for pollinators such as bees, butterflies and hoverflies.



Areas of the cemetery that are left slightly "unkempt", with longer grass, small patches of brambles and ivy on trees are vital for hibernating invertebrates, nesting birds and animals such as hedgehogs. While the **Cemetery harbours good** numbers of species, there is a national decline in most invertebrates, as well as birds and mammals, so it is very important to not only maintain what we have, but to improve areas for wildlife as well – Jeremy Bartlett (Friends of Earlham)



Natural burials enhance the Cemetery, by allowing the area to be managed with wildlife in mind.



Success stories so far:

- New Muslim cemetery serving the Muslim communities in Norfolk
- Reintroduction of shroud burials and the active involvement of the congregation
- New raised plots covered in sedum matting requiring less ongoing maintenance
- Planting of Lavender and Rosemary bushes, increasing pollinator rich plants
- Installation of meadow mat in a unused woodland section of the Rosary cemetery in preparation of the launch of Natural burials in 2021
