




The main principle was to create a settlement *in* the landscape








Wrekin Local Plan 1995 – 2006:

- The Green Network again afforded protection through planning policy.
- Introduces the concept of multifunctional green space.
- 2002 Green Network Guidance maps green and blue 'functions'.
- Identifying:
 - Key 'nodes'
 - Strategic 'corridors' and
 - 'Links'
 - These policies are carried forward into Core Strategy 2007-2016.

1990 – 2010





Telford and Wrekin Local Plan 2011 - 2031:

- Mapping of the Green Network is refined.
- Extended to include the nearby market town of Newport.
- Definition and aims revised to be in line with:
 - National Planning Policy
 Framework NPPF, and
 - 'Making Space For Nature' The Lawton Review







- Working with 'Grow Wild' to create high value habitats on their doorstep












The future of green spaces: The Green Guarantee




The Green Guarantee is a commitment by the Council to protect over 150 Council owned green spaces valued by local communities








Between 2016 and 2018 200 Green Guarantee sites have been approved by cabinet. Sites include; allotments, amenity sites, formal parks and gardens, woodlands and urban green spaces.








Sites are protected by removing delegated authority for both sale and change of use. Both of which would require full cabinet approval.







Delegated responsibility is retained for works in the community interest such as site enchantments for leisure and recreation and the removal/replacement of infrastructure.







The site protection forms a foundation for local community groups.

The designation helps volunteer groups make bids for funding for capital works and community engagement projects








In 2018, as part of Telford's 50th birthday celebrations the Council invested £50,000 legacy funding in our Green Guarantee sites.
