

FLINT CONSERVATION AREA





- ☐ Flint Conservation Area first designated in June 1988
- Boundary corresponds with remaining 'grid iron' street pattern dating from Edward I time
- Area covers the main historic retail and commercial core of the town centre
- □ Principally 19th and 20th Century buildings
- Small number of 16th, 17th & 18th Century buildings
- □ Includes five Listed Buildings

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED

- Lack of appreciation of heritage value
- □ High levels of inappropriate alterations. Widespread problems in relation to shop-frontages and signage
- Lack of maintenance of properties
- Vacant floorspace particularly upper floors which is long standing













SOLUTIONS

- Promote an understanding of the special qualities of the Conservation Area
- Through example and encouragement promote good conservation practices for older buildings
- Encourage sympathetic changes to more recent buildings
- Regular monitoring of the Conservation Area
- Notify building owners of unauthorised changes and take the necessary enforcement action
- Investigate available grant assistance




TOWNSCAPE HERITAGE INITIATIVE

- □ Flint Townscape Heritage Initiative (THI) bid was submitted to the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) in 2008 for £920,000 by Flintshire County Council
- Bid approved and supplemented with £655,000 of partnership funding provided by Flintshire County Council, Flint Town Council and Cadw
- □ Scheme provides grant assistance for:
 - architectural reinstatement
 - historic repairs
 - reuse of vacant floorspace
- Particular emphasis on:
 - Market Square / Trelawny Square
 - Chester Street
 - Church Street
- Requirement to tackle groups of buildings to comprehensively restore the historic streetscape




- □ Eighteen individual buildings have been completed to date with a further three currently on site. Additional projects planned before the end of the scheme, including an ambitious project for the Town Hall.
- ☐ Flint THI has spent over £960,000 to date on targeted buildings.
- ☐ This has levered in an additional £1,153,556 of private sector funding resulting in a total investment of £2,113,556 into the town centre.
