


# Trees and Woodland Strategies update





### **Trees and Woodland Strategies toolkit**

- Trees and Woodland Strategy (TAWS) toolkit was launched early in 2023.
- Aims to help local authorities develop and deliver TAWS that are collaborative and set a vision for the local treescape.
- Funded by Defra.
- Created through co-design process, presents useful evidence, info and case studies.
- Has received great support and interest from local authorities, and sector organisations, agencies, and central gov departments.

### **Launch workshops**

- Held four regional workshops in Spring 2023.
- Attended by 130 people (97% from local authorities).
- Sparked ideas and lots of advice shared.
- An attendee from a city council said:

"I came back with a good list of actions and fired-up to push forward on our strategy review".













#### Tracking change

- Funding until 2023-2025 to monitor impact of toolkit and support.
- Workshops included evidence gathering, plus we conducted a survey over the summer to gain more insights.
- Appears to be plenty of activity and development of strategies, but some face hurdles getting started.




Fig 1: Summary of TAWS tracker survey, based on evidence gathered at workshops and survey for a sample of 25 local authorities.







# Working across departments and disciplines

- TAWS often involve individuals from different departments.
- Trees are often providing value beyond the 'tree team', e.g. health and wellbeing.
- Workshops had a range (as shown, right).
- Engaging effectively with internal and external stakeholders is a key common challenge and an opportunity.




Fig 2: Local authority departments represented at workshops (based on sample).







### Workshops for local authorities – Autumn 2023

- Holding four online workshops open to all local authorities in England.
- Aim to provide support and better understand how to make progress on tree strategies.
- Opportunity to identify gaps in support and resources.

Research overview










## Why is this project needed?

- Ambitious tree establishment targets at national and local level.
- Increased spending on tree planting value for money important.
- High profile failures in media = increased scrutiny.
- Poor outcomes could lead to disengagement of key stakeholders.
- Little centralised evidence on survival rates and causes of young tree losses reliance on anecdotes.
- We know local authorities and others want to engage with this.
- Better evidence will help us learn from experience and demonstrate impact.



# Research approach










- Partnership research project with Fera, Forest Research, and TTC. Funding from Defra.
- Seeking to understand:
  - Who collects data on survival rates and causes of mortality?
  - What current systems of sharing data and knowledge exist?
  - How variable is data gathering across the sector?
  - Who is interested in being involved in efforts to improve evidence?
  - What are the primary causes of mortality?
  - What are key factors in successful establishment?
- Year 1 is a scoping study, leading to proposal for ongoing research.

- Do you monitor survival rates for planting schemes?
- If there are losses, how are these recorded and reported?
- Do you record the causes of mortality? e.g. drought, vandalism, etc.
- What do you think would be useful for you and the sector?


# Shared Outcomes Fund, Trees Outside Woodland
