But then John Seddon says...



- Economy of scale is a myth
- Shared services do not result in a reduced total cost
- In fact the cost may even go up as 'failure demand' will increase

And then the Williams Commission in Wales says




. . . .

'Economies of scale also exist in the unit costs of particular services'

For refuse collection 'it is clear that economies of scale are at work: as service volume increases, unit costs decrease'

PI 02b – Cost of service per head of population (excluding CEC)


What does the evidence tell us?



- As Williams points out refuse collection unit costs vary enormously
- This is not a normally distributed data set
- So something is going on


But is it down to scale?






r = 0.05 or very very weakly **positive** correlation!!!

Cost per household




Bigger area?

- Resilience


How about shared management?
