MSW Landfill Ban

- **O Date now looks fixed**
- **•Will it happen?**
- **•**Authorities still in the planning & procurement stage
- **OReduction in landfill facilities**
- **ODifficult to deal with wastes**
- **•**Financial implications / business models
- **ODisappearing landfill option**



Role of Incineration in Scotland

- Approaching the critical point of MSW versus available facilities
- Expect to be around 9 -11 facilities operational by the start of 2026 with between 2 – 4 facilities heading towards completion and commissioning
- Report predicts an initial shortfall in capacity which will be filled by the end of 2026 early 2027
- Remaining authorities will need to fit this timescale with contracts
- $\circ~$ Alternative technologies still in the background
- $\circ~$ Decarbonisation and heat recovery for existing facilities





Deposit & Return - EPR

- $\,\circ\,$ DRS protracted and drawn out
- \circ Will it happen in its current form?
- Planning and changes to collections delayed
- \circ Contractual issues arising
- **o EPR Reporting & Data Management**
- Ring fenced funding back to authorities?







Waste Routemap & CE Bill

- CE Bill to enable the Routemap actions to come to life
- $\circ~$ Any new regulations will still need consultation time
- Key potential actions
 - Recycling targets for local authorities (recycling, preparation for reuse, composting) with financial incentives / penalties
 - Changes to ability to charge for garden waste and special uplifts
 - Householder responsibility to recycle supported by fixed penalties
 - Mandatory compliance by Local Authorities with Household Recycling Charter and Code of Practice
 - $\circ~$ New provisions on flytipping and littering

Local Authority Challenges

- $\circ\,$ Most policy uncertainty for a decade
- Changes need to be supported and based on solid data and evidence
- Need for a longer term consolidated approach to enable future delivery and infrastructure
