ENERGY - PERSONAL PRIORITY (1a)

Personal Drivers

- Concern re. energy pricing / fuel poverty
- Concern over energy security post Brexit
- Unrealised alternative income streams for LA's
- Global Green House Gas Emission (GHG)
- Stimulation the green economy and local supply chains





ENERGY – PERSONAL PRIORITY (1b)

Awakening – (Realisation and Discovery)

- Municipal Energy not new / not common now
- Energy revolution underway citizen/municipal
- Technology revolution
- Councils done some work but stalled
- Pricing / innovative financing offers LA opportunity to restart





ENERGY - PERSONAL PRIORITY (2)

WHAT (Was/Am I trying to do)

Idea/Ambition – Solar Battery System for every new build three years hence

After Reality check and engagement ..

Simply... develop a Local Policy to create a regulatory framework within Darlington and surrounding areas (Tees Valley) to further mandate the use of renewal energy solutions within residential developments

As ever – if only life were simple...,

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BARRIERS

- Officer support competing priorities
- Needs sub-regional approach we cannot do this in isolation (in Darlington)
- House builders / developers no incentive for private house builders
- Public Perception still seen as being either risk, long payback periods or for 'green' people
- Regulatory Framework Moving goalposts

ENERGY – TACTICS

- ENGAGE ENGAGE ENGAGE
- Use APSE Energy on pitch and as a resource
- Start gently / do the politics internally and externally
- Identify key stakeholders lobby and connect
- Make it in non threatening point to the wider agenda (jobs / fuel poverty) - point to the potential /value – in widest sense
- Make them think it's their idea
- Create a vision of the future that makes sense (no brainers)
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LESSONS FROM ABROAD (1)

Attended 'TWINS - Cities in climate change' International Conference Essen (Green Capital of Europe 2017). Aims:

- Desire by the Ruhr area to seek to positively address climate change through positive cross border engagement
- 200 participants from at least 22 countries in attendance. Seeking to create:
- Personal encounters between specialists from the areas of environment, climate protection and urban and rural planning
- More than short-term interaction develop and support the creation of long-term international contacts and working relationships.

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LESSONS FROM ABROAD (2)

Key Messages

- Smart Cities the new Garlic Bread
- Decarbonise transport (a call for fewer cars not newer cars) and integrated planning approaches (oh dear Prius versus XC60)
- Renewable energy consistency of approach needed
- Stop seeking to justify why green buildings should be built and articulate what value they bring
- Public authorities should be role models on this agenda by when undertaking public procurement

LESSONS FROM ABROAD (3)

Key personal lessons:

- Challenge is worse than thought but major opportunities
- Need to de-carbonise transportation
- The climate change movement broad church, with differing foci and interests;
- International networks are critical not just at governmental level but also LA - learning from best international practice
- Government and municipalities can steer but public engagement is critical





PERSONAL CONCLUSION

- World is changing energy revolution is underway;
- Opportunity to be bold and transformational
- As an LA many reasons NOT to do this but some solid reasons to do it;
 - Real economic case

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- Will meet many priorities: income generation, HWB outcomes, supply chain and micro-investments
- Learn from neighbours and internationally
- Can't do this in isolation engage neighbours and consider at scale
