
Background

- The service was managed from two offices, grounds maintenance was part of another service area these now merged into one office and as part of one wider service area
- Working practices were fragmented with differing work cultures and priorities
- Service was subsidised to around £300k per year however the service is now self supporting and returning a surplus each year
- IT system was split into the two offices but is now amalgamated in one system Epilog Sequel (Gower)
- Mercury Abatement Fund created to pay for upgrade of systems / Environmental surcharge fund

Scope of Service

- 3 fully operational Cemeteries
- 1 Crematorium Average 2000 Cremations per year
- 17 Closed Cemeteries / Churchyards across the city centre and wider city area
- Portfolio of buildings including 1 Crematorium, 3 Chapel's, 1 Assembly room, 1 main office and 2 Lodge Houses
- Responsibility for all Grounds Maintenance 68 hectares, Grave digging (average 800 burials per year), Exhumations, hard surface areas and boundaries
- Head stone safety policy adopted and a new inspection team now established.
- Provision of the Public Health Funeral Service
- Provision of the Nottingham Funeral


- Mercury Abatement
- Recycling of metals scheme (ICCM)
- Members of the CAMEO burden sharing scheme
- Energy review gas usage
- Apprenticeship scheme
- Feasibility into battery powered grounds equipment
- Solar Panels installed on Crematorium roof





Sustainability

 Highwood Cemetery has well established wildflower meadows on most areas not currently operational along with a historic woodland







Quality Awards

- Charter for the Bereaved (Gold Standard)
- Three sites have Green Flag awards namely Wilford Hill (Southern Cemetery) / Northern Cemetery and Highwood Cemetery
- Two Community Green Flag awards for closed churchyards
- Cemetery & Crematorium service of the year 2016 finalist



Income Generation

- Fees & Charges comprehensive review of fees each year
- Land use all areas of land reviewed to ensure best use and to maximise space available including provision of new burial systems to be sold as family plots





Income Generation

- Public Health funerals administration neighbouring authorities
- Extension of services at weekends
- Additional service options Memorial Roses Bird Boxes Memorial seat plaques
- Efficient administration leases good communication of options
- Online Burial & Cremation records
- Challenge to Business rates £40k per year saving



Nottingham Funeral / Public Health Funerals

- New Nottingham Funeral package in place with numbers increasing from 160 in 2010 to over 300 in 2015
- Commercial approach to advertising this package, all of these funerals have to be booked with our facilities
- Public Health Funerals policy in place, up to 130 referrals per year, this service is now being offered to neighbouring authorities for Nottingham to administer




