- Sets demanding targets for the UK
- UK has met interim targets in 2010 / 2015

- Key definitions of waste

- Position if the UK remains in the EEA
 - loss of influence?

- Position if the UK exits the EU / EEA
 - UK has the power to amend and repeal EU Law

 EU Law has been a key driver behind UK's rapid progress on sustainable resource and waste management



Circular Economy and Government Priority

Circular Economy (CE)

- Concept gained momentum in 2015
- Focus on reuse and circulation
- Government must lend its support towards CE
- Estimated 1 trillion (Euro) economic benefits by 2020

Government Priority

- Waste management economic/environmental benefits
- Indication that Government is not concerned with waste and recycling sector



Retaining and Developing New Markets

- Circular Economy is one which depends on the development of new infrastructure
- Crucial time for progress
- Minimum requirements
- Brexit could undermine economically efficient decisionmaking
