 - 4 Cemeteries and 1 Crematorium
 - 223 Equipped play areas
 - 8 Outdoor gyms
 - Over 149,000 trees
 - Sport facilities
 - Community based events and activities on parks
 - 8million users per year

is being set up in the heart of a city suburb.

Residents of Clarendon Park have signed a lease with the city council to take over the management of the site in Bul-Nick Jukes, chairman of Clar-

create something the community could enjoy." The earden run by residents will provide a productive green space for people and wildlife. "This is an exciting grass-roots project which is being

driven by the enthusiasm o residents," Nick sald. residents, "Nick said.
"With our vision of ecological
regeneration and with the

make a vibrant green space for

the city."

Ideas for the site have been discussed at public meetings.

Nick said the design would reflect local needs and help to nsure the site's environment al and economic sustainability and an economic sustainability.
The garden will feature water harvesting from roofs, raised beds for small-scale and access-ible gardening, composting fa-cilities, a pond and other wildlife-friendly features. All work in the garden will

"We want to be able to see people coming in and using the place, sitting, reading, playing and helping out," said Nick. Volunteers have been prepar-ing the site and have already added four tonnes of soil and compost to improve the land. Jenny Ford, secretary of the group, said: "Leicester City Council should be congratu-

lated for taking this positive step of releasing the land for the community to manage.
