

Everyone has the right to play

Article 31 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) creates a specific right for all children to engage in play and recreational activities.

The governments disability action plan has a specific section on playgrounds. The plan uses Fair Play playground as a model.



- 24 % percent of our population is disabled.
- Siblings are unable to play together.
 - People with disabilities are mostly isolated.
- **Playgrounds have significant health, fitness** and well being benefits.
- **Disability 'price tag' cost of living extra £975 per month** (Scope Charity)
 - Lets even the playing field!

Why is this important?

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Society can tap into a broader range of talents and perspectives leading to innovation and social progress – everyone has something to contribute

Inclusion is important for a healthy society.

Designing for accessibility is easy!



- Wetpour safety surfacing to ensure wheelchair accessibility.
- Flat landscape to give clear sightlines for carers.
- Textured path for the visually impaired.
- Single entrance/exit to prevent users leaving without their carer's knowledge.
- Accessible equipment for wheelchair users and people who need support. • Inclusive equipment allowing children of all abilities to play alongside one
- another.
- Equipment that enables rocking, swinging, spinning, climbing and sliding. • Sensory activity panels for touch, movement and sound. Customised communications boards for non – verbal people, people who don't speak the same language or have dementia, placed strategically around the playground at various heights.

- Quiet spots for downtime
- Slightly raised heights of equipment for teenagers and adults • Picnic tables with seating spaces for multiple wheelchairs for family and
- friends to sit together
- Disabled toilet
- Toilet facility with changing bed.
- Easy access to local transport buses and trains
- **Disabled** parking
- Proximity to a café





- Fair Play can be replicated in whole or in part.
- Existing playgrounds can be made more accessible by refurbishing piece by piece.
 - Cost to maintain is minimally more. It is agreed that it's a small amount to pay for the benefits.
