



Reporting on Social Value achieved throughout contract lifecycle



The policy in practice


Our new cleaning supplier has **set policies** around recycling-specifically checking what is in recycling sacks Our external decorating supplier **recycles** all paint cans by sending them to a charity that uses them to make park benches We have assisted a local SME working on our Landscaping framework to employ two apprentices to work on projects in Southampton

The main contractor building a school in Shirley are currently **reporting spend** with local suppliers of 82% Our street lighting across the city is **due to transfer to LED lighting.** The reduction in carbon emissions will be calculated and reported on.

How might the new Procurement Bill affect SCC's approach?

New regime proposes to remove the requirement for evaluations made solely from the point of view of the contracting authority Most Economically Advantageous Tender (MEAT) contracts will change and be awarded based on Most Advantageous Tender (MAT) This reinforces contracting authorities to take a broader view when determining evaluation criteria and do not have to confine themselves to price or other economic criteria This will help to reinforce social value and environmental good to give a greater focus on outcomes and solutions for communities or contract users This will allow SCC to further progress a targeted approach to achieve local outcomes which will have direct impact on residents and service users
