

Delivering a Food Waste Service for High-rise Properties in Fife

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Fife

- Population C. 370,000
- Area 1235 sq km
- Mixture of urban and rural properties
- 3rd Largest LA in Scotland





Fife - Domestic Waste Collection

- Every week over 186,000 properties receive a bin collection service, (4 x waste streams: Landfill, Cans & Plastics, Food & Garden Waste and Paper & Cardboard) Over 13 million bins collected per year
- 27 x 26t front line RCVs and 3 x 16.5t RCVs

 Rural & Hard to Access
 Approx 240 employees
- Twin shift system (Day shift 06:00 13:42 & Back shift 13:18 21:00)
- Moving to a new 4 day shift pattern October 2024



Trial Overview

Fife Council colleagues worked with Sustainable Sidekicks on a 12week food waste collection trial in high rise properties taking a research and science-informed communications approach.

Trial objectives:

- 1. Maximise participation in food waste service
- 2. Learn about barriers and enablers
- 3. Trial communication materials
- Gather insights for food waste service rollout across high and mid rise properties



Ravenscraig Flats Kirkcaldy

- 3 Flats each with 86 properties
- Mixture of 1 and 2 bedroom properties
- Mixed demographic of owners/private rent and council



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- MetroSTOR FX-FP models were fitted with footpedal operated lids
- Touch free, making it easier for residents to participate in food waste disposal by enabling them to place their food into the container without touching the bin or lid – residents liked this


Food waste as a resource messaging






Where to purchase caddy liners




Interviews and Surveys

Why do you think it is a good idea to collect food waste separately from the general waste? (Please tick all that are relevant to you)




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Waste Figures and Trends

- Average of 45kg per week
- Peak in weight on week 3 when Council staff and researcher's on site to conduct interviews
- Weights peaked again on week 7 when postcards were delivered
- Some weeks two collections took place as bins were full by the beginning of the week
- There was contamination one week from takeaway material





Fife Wide Rollout – recommendations

Infrastructure

- Ease and convenience Locate as close to buildings as possible to make it as easy
 as possible for people to use the service, like non-flat residents.
- **Stronger caddy liners** Supply a quantity (three- four rolls) of 16-micron thickness liners (rather than the thinner quality ones provided at present due to internal cost-saving measures).
- Bin design Choose high-quality bins that include pedals, and reduced aperture. Plan
 to put litter bins alongside them if contamination is found.
- Doorstep collection If practical offer a doorstep collection for housebound residents where caretakers can facilitate.



Fife Wide Rollout – recommendations

Communication

- **Pre-launch comms** Plan a pre-launch round of communications to let people know it is coming so that they feel involved and informed
- Benefits to households All communications and leaflets focus on the benefits to the households and their blocks of flats
- **Pictorial checklists** Include caddy stickers and bins with salient pictorial checklists that include icons of what goes in the bin and what does not.
- **Feedback** Provide feedback on food waste collected and usage so people know their actions are making a difference and others are acting.
- Address rumours and fears Address rumours and fears around vermin to avoid rumours escalating and the food bins being the root of the problem.
- Answer uncertainties Advise people on where to get caddy liners from and alternative free ways to line the bin.



Feedback to residents to reinforce behaviours

- Posters
- Tenants magazine articles
- Newspaper articles
- Motivating users to keep going
- Highlighting the impact of their efforts
- Reinforcing it as a social norm

Every little bit has power!

We are pleased to announce that well over 1 tonne was deposited in 12 weeks. Which as a resident said "that is the same as 20 bags of coal".

- · One banana skin can charge a mobile phone twice-32 bananas will power a family home for One hour!
- 100 tonnes of food waste a day can generate enough energy to power 800-1400 homes each year.

Reasons for collecting food waste

- The food waste goes to a processing plant that generates energy and fertilizer.
- · The energy goes to heat care and retirement homes, Carnegie leisure centre, a supermarket, local art gallery and 388 houses on the local heating network



Your opportunity to participate

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Fife wide rollout and next steps

- The findings and data from the trial were used to write an application for Zero Waste Scotland's Recycling Improvement Fund
- In December 2023 our application was successful
- The team are now working to rollout a food collection service across the
 12 high-rise and 18 mid-rise blocks in Fife
- Next steps potentially will be chute closures for all high-rise blocks
- Dunfermline city centre and St Andrews town centre??
