Why do residents put the wrong things in their recycling bin?

Whilst recycling has increased in most cases and well done Wales for your recycling rates, WRAP research shows that 80% (4 in 5) UK households put things that are not collected locally in their bin especially plastic film and wrapping, toothpaste tubes and cooking glassware.

WRAP's feedback is that the information provided still isn't clear enough to 44% of their respondents.

In some areas contamination has increased from 4% to over 25%, more than half a million tonnes of household recycling was rejected in 2019/20, this equates to £48 million.

Are we doing enough and how do we reduce contamination?

UK-wide effective recycling is associated with the following scheme characteristics:

- A restricted/limited capacity for general rubbish
- A higher number of materials collected for recycling
- A food waste recycling service
- A "multi-stream" recycling scheme where residents sort recycling into different containers
- A service that collects small waste electricals and textiles.
- The best performing households live in Welsh "Collections Blueprint" areas that provide a clear and consistent recycling service.

Kerbside Sort v Co-mingled?

Is it time to change? Funding? One council paying £208,000 a month due to contamination last year



Why now?

- Constricting markets and legislation has resulted in tighter controls at MRFs
- Less "recycling" staff to encourage and educate
- More rejected loads so increase in collection and disposal costs
- The change to definition output from sorting facility rather than input impact on 2025 targets

Other Actions

Several councils are reminding residents about putting the wrong thing in the wrong bin

Some are using technology to generate reminder letters after tagging contaminated bins, some offer to empty for a charge, most won't empty unless wrong items removed. Some are even threatening to take bin away

Enforcement?

Advise, Support, not Punish

Recommendations and lessons from others

- WRAP recommends using Recycle Now assets, promote Britain Recycle/Does and Recycle Week these apparently work with 18-34s, urbanites, and those disposing incorrectly.
- Provide clear information what can and can't be recycled locally
- Using Recycling Locator so people know where to recycle what
- Councils should work towards collecting a common set of dry recyclables and food waste.

What next?

- UK Government make manufacturers of non-recyclable packaging pay for extra sorting and disposal.
- It is considering a surcharge on single use plastic.
- It is consulting on extended producer responsibility
- It is consulting in consistency in recycling
- It is consulting again on the deposit return scheme and hope to implement in 2024! It's 2 years since I completed last consultation and 11 years since they announced their waste review
- Fines?
- More sharing of best practice which I am sure APSE can help with
