

- We introduced a standalone website with full functioning E-Commerce





Results across Yrs. 1&2

- Increase in wildflower varieties across the site identified by our local experts on two separate walk arounds
- A visible increase in invertebrates
- Large quantities of honey and an additional swarm added to our hives for 2023/24
- Reduced use of chemicals with the plan to ultimately phase them out all together in 2024 using controlled burning via a lance
- Self-sufficient in wood chip and compost created by our own works team
- Green Flag 2 years running
- ICCM Gold status for outdoor operations for the first time
- All for a budget of £2,000

- Public survey
- Create working management plan for our other site, St Johns which has a very different distinct set of issues to address before we can apply for Green Flag status
