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Redefining "Community" through the introduction of Communal Bins

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Presentation Overview





 Lessons from Liverpool's ambitious alleyway improvement and communal bin programme in changing the community's relationship with waste management.









- Liverpool has approximately 22,700 properties built adjacent to a 4ft (foot) wide alleyway which receive a weekly collection of bagged domestic waste from the rear alleyway.
- In addition to the waste management issues, the physical condition of the many alleyways (primarily 4fts) across the city is poor. Collapsed drains, the erosion of sub soil etc. has led to uneven surfaces and even collapses (including one on refuse worker).
- These circumstances have driven the need to deliver a programme to address the failing alleyway infrastructure and the poor working conditions for refuse workers in 4ft. alleyways.



Balancing common ground rules with customising the message

- Programme Objectives / Benefits
 - To improve the local environment for all residents by removing the storage of waste from alleyways
 - To enable improved resident access to the alleyway and their homes,
 - To address residents' concerns of rats, flies and smells from the alleyways,
 - To provide a safe working environment for collection and cleaning crews.
 - To increase the City's recycling performance
 - To develop an efficient, effective, sustainable and scalable waste collection service for properties adjacent to 4ft alleyways


