# Co-location of public services



- Woolston Neighbourhood Hub was the first co-located site in Warrington – refurbished existing leisure facilities, introduction of library and GP services along with a children's centre.
- Orford Jubilee Neighbourhood Hub an innovative new hub for public services that would act as a catalyst for the social, physical and economic regeneration of the area.

Leisure visits	271,520	1,300,612	+379%
Library visits	46,075	132,322	+187%
Library issues (children materials)	37,879 (11,337)	53,874 (25,076)	+42% (+121%)



#### Benefits of co-location

The benefits of co-locating complimentary services, based on the needs of the community, are wide ranging and include:

- Introduce people to services they would not traditionally engage with;
- Makes it more convenient for users to access additional services;
- Enables services to work together more effectively for the benefit of customers;
- Allows services to share costs and achieve best value;
- Provides stigma free environments for the delivery of services
- Improved physical accessibility



# From co-location to integration

- Co-location has certainly had a significant impact on increasing and widening the number of people that access our services, but more can still be done.
- We have learnt valuable lessons from Woolston and Orford
   Jubilee Neighbourhood Hub's and are now using this knowledge
   to inform our newest development Great Sankey
   Neighbourhood Hub based on 4 key principles:
  - 1. Community need
  - 2. Stakeholder support
  - 3. Innovation
  - 4. Customer experience





### Dementia Friendly design

- The first public building in the world to achieve gold accreditation for Dementia Friendly design, awarded by University of Sterling.
- Principles of designing for dementia is good practice for orientation around buildings, signage etc that will support users with autism or visual impairment.
- More than 100 LiveWire staff have become Dementia Friends.
- Piloted dementia screening programme with CCG early diagnosis.
- Trained our lifestyle staff in dementia awareness.
- Dementia Friendly programme Gym quiet hours, DF group exercise classes.






# Improved physical accessibility

- Fully accessible fitness suite
- Wide corridors
- Lift or ramp access to all levels (not easy!)
- Changing places
- Furniture carefully selected
- Worked closely with Warrington Disability Partnership on design





# Bewsey and Dallam Community Hub


- New facility opens summer 2020
- Anchor building within a targeted regeneration programme for the area, that has inspired a 'central area' masterplan
- In the heart of our most deprived communities.
- Close to Orford Neighbourhood Hub but 'on the doorstep' for Bewsey and Dallam residents.
- Community Hub Neighbourhood services co-located to encourage community usage, local groups, etc.
- Kitchen, community storage, community rooms built in.

# Bewsey and Dallam Community Hub

- New pool design dual use public hydrotherapy / learner pool.
- Fully accessible, e.g. hoist directly from changing place to pool.
- New considerations for more complex customer base,
  e.g. higher pool and air temperature.
- Dementia friendly design principles retained.
