What do we do?

- Traditionally encouraged and enabled local people to participate through topic-based action groups
- Over the last year developed programmes to encourage, enable and support climate action groups in local communities across the district

Topic-based action groups

- Community Energy Action Group encourages local projects
- Culture Shift uses creativity to connect with people
- Edible Stroud plants edible plants in public spaces
- Repair Café fixes electrical and other items
- Stroud Community TV makes and shares videos celebrating local life
- Stroud District Action on Plastic helps eliminate single use plastic
- Textiles Group mends clothes, swaps fabric and learns new skills
- Transport Action Group to improve shared transport provision

Local Climate Action Groups – what are they?

- Groups active in specific geographic communities, taking practical initiatives to reduce carbon emissions and build community resilience
- Groups uniquely shaped in their own areas and neighbourhoods:
 - Some are ward or parish-based, and others cover a number of parishes.
 - Some are community-led, others are working groups of their Parish or Town Council with community involvement

Local CAGs – what do they do?

- Promote **behaviour change** so local people reduce their carbon footprints
- Develop low carbon community projects so local people get involved and work together
- Network across community, public and business sectors so a range of local groups and organisations get involved
- Build local support for, and involvement in, district-wide CN2030 programmes
- Parish/Town Councils influence, enable and do!

Local CAGs – where are they?

• Community-led:

 Across several parishes – Berkeley, Dursley, Wotton
 Parish-based - Horsley, Nailsworth, Randwick and Rodborough
 Ward based – Slade/Trinity

• Parish/Town Council linked action groups - Bisley,

- Chalford, Coaley, Stonehouse and Stroud Town
- Currently cover 20 of 52 parishes across the District

A TS priority - helping local CAGs start-up

Work with local stakeholders to organise **start-up workshops** – 3 held so far, a 4th under discussion.

If requested, follow-up the workshops by:

- convening and facilitating the first 'core group' meeting
- speaking at a launch meeting



Getting started - Principles of Good Practice

- Understand your place and community What do local people value about their locality and lives within it? Given that, how can we best do our bit to tackle climate change?'
- Map local stakeholders identify who's active on stuff, make contact, open conversations and explore the potential to work together
- **Develop an initial strategy** appropriate to your place and community.
- Identify potential projects and develop a plan of action

Local Groups: communicating climate change

- Seek to **resonate with peoples' concerns** with what matters to them and how climate change will affect them directly
- Tailor messaging to engage with 'self-transcendent' values, eg about community well-being, a sense of responsibility and a duty to future generations
- Seek to be engaging and build balanced optimism two-way dialogue is crucial, avoid preachy communication, and don't seek to persuade forcefully
- Nurture agency and empowerment

A TS priority – building a network of CAGs

- TS has convened the first two meetings of a Local CAG Forum, attended by representatives of all the current groups
- The **objectives** of the Forum are:
 - $\odot \mbox{To share information, experience and learning}$
 - To identify and enable the development of joint initiatives and projects
 - To provide input and feedback to Stroud District Council
 To enable the support and take-up of CN2030 initiatives
- Our aspiration a vibrant, collaborative, well-supported network

Working with local specialists: low carbon mapping



Working with partners: domestic energy awareness training

- How carbon reductions through home energy retrofit compare with other potential climate actions
- Deep retrofit: what is it, what experiences of it do the group have, and what can it achieve?
- Doing things well: how to find carbon-zero contractors
- DIY collective organising community climate action through DIY retrofit
- What next: tools, tips and services to do things right

Drawing on local group good practice: promoting behaviour change

- Seek commitments to act when people are asked to make pledges, such as to save energy or re-cycle, they are more likely to follow through with their planned actions
- NCAN Pledge of the Month 'Climate Constance' advice in local paper. Example *Water* - reduce your daily shower from 10 to 5 minutes - reduces your carbon footprint by 400 kilograms a year. To make the pledge, text "Yes" to 07506 005 852 (http://www.ncat.btck.co.uk/PledgeofTheMonth)
- NCAN On-line 'pledge sheet' covering 40 different pledges and amount of carbon saved

CN2030: the District Council's Early Steps

- Appointed a 'Carbon Neutral' Officer Rachel Brain
- Commissioned a renewable energy assessment to inform Local Plan development
- Consulting on a draft Local Plan tackling climate change an over-arching priority
- Developing a comprehensive plan of action
- Supporting community action
 - \odot input to the local CAG Forum
 - o input to a National Lottery bid
 - o funding for a network support worker

The Challenges

 \odot Enabling the setting up groups in all parts of the district \odot Enabling groups to engage with 'hard to reach' communities

- Building capacity in groups, helping groups to be sustainable
