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Why we need wildflower meadows

- 97% of our lowland wildflower meadows lost since WWII
- Those that remain are small in size and isolated

- Pollinators are worth over £510 million per year
- Many species are experiencing decline


A wildflower meadow is a grassland habitat containing native annual, biennial and perennial flora.





State of the Market Survey 2015

Local Authority Parks and Green Spaces Services



- 77% agreed or strongly agreed that reductions in funding resulted in withdrawal of maintenance from some land.
- Managed correctly this is an opportunity to promote biodiversity.
- Decreased bedding, shrub maintenance and frequency of grass cuts.
- 80% make specific provision for promoting biodiversity. Many through planting flower meadows.

- Initial cost




The benefits of wildflower meadows

- Carbon reduction and sequestration
- Biodiversity
- Health

- Long-term cost savings
- Energy production
- Community acceptance
- Community involvement

Land use	Carbon sequestered kg/ha/yr
Grassland	240 (+/- 200)
Forestry	110 (+/- 4)
Arable	Loses 140 (+/- 100)





Things to consider when planning a meadow

- Your starting point
- Your objective
- Community buy in
- Site preparation needed
- Species you would like to grow
- Management and monitoring
- Advice if things go wrong

Year 2 -Biennials and perennials
