- What is Neighbourhood Operations?
 - Roads Maintenance £6million
 - Environmental maintenance £6million
 - Grounds maintenance
 - Burials
 - Street Cleansing
 - Public conveniences
 - Rapid response



The services involved in the review are:

- Grounds Maintenance £2.5million
- Street cleansing £1.1million
- Bereavement Services £1million
- Public conveniences £400k
- Rapid response £1million



Some numbers

- Amenity grass - £990k

High amenity - £14k

Rough grass - £67k

Bedding - £216k

Rose beds - £28k

Woodland - £350k

– Play areas - £208k



Council agreed to the review, 30th January 2014

Purpose of review:

- To deliver efficient services whilst continuing to meet the prioritised needs of the communities served by Scottish Borders Council.
- This includes making required savings of £450,000 (£250,000 in 2014-15 and £200,000 in 2015-16) which will help the Council towards its savings target of £28.7million

- (a) Agrees to the review of Neighbourhood Operations' Services, including Parks and Open Spaces provision, Bereavement Services, Public Conveniences and Street Cleansing.
- (b) Agrees to the inclusion of maintenance within Burial Grounds as part of the assessment
- (c) Agrees to the assessment criteria being used as the basis of the review of grounds maintenance (see Appendix One)
- (d) Agrees to the establishment of a community fund which is created to support the growth in volunteer/community involvement/partnership development aimed at delivering the revenue financial plan savings targets
- e) Agrees that the discussion in respect of service reviews should commence with Ward Members and then extend to Community Councils and or other community groups as identified by local members
 - (f) Agrees that service changes which have an impact on the public will only be implemented following agreement on a locality by locality basis at Area Forums; and
 - (g) Agrees to authorise the Head of Neighbourhood Services to make service adjustments to services where they have no immediate impact on the public



The kinds of changes being considered include:

- Reduced grass cutting
- Stopping grass cutting
- Changes to litter bin locations/street cleansing visits
- Different ways of providing water in some cemeteries
- Changes to provision of public conveniences in some areas


Site Assessment - How?


- An 8 point assessment has been undertaken across all green space areas currently maintained by SBC to identify priority assets

- Street Cleansing review






What does this all mean?


- 'Low scoring' areas can not deliver the level of savings, without going much deeper.
