Reasons for the Review

- Realignment to net zero targets
 - ▶ Reference to LA Climate Emergency/Net Zero targets
- Fabric first is essential as a low regret investment
- Decarbonisation of heat

Representation on the Review Group

Social Housing Sector well represented on the Review Group

Key Asks For Landlords

- Clarity on targets and timescales.
- Confirmation on metrics to be applied.
- The role of district heating
- ► A place for hydrogen?
- 'No regrets' investment
- Funding

Challenges of Achieving EESSH 2

Mixed tenure blocks

- Difficulty of differing standards applying to different tenures within a block
- Potential of two tier system in mixed tenure blocks

Gypsy Travellers Sites

- Different forms of accommodation
- Differing construction types

Grid capacity

- Constraints on the grid
- Electrification of heat

Skills Gap

Lack of suitably skilled contractors/developed supply chain

Just Transition

Ensure most vulnerable do not pay

Benefits of EESSH 2

- Align with Fabric First
 - ► Fabric first is essential as a low regret investment
- ► The alignment of EESSH2 with Net Zero is critical
- Work towards decarbonisation
- Makes homes more energy efficient
- ► The new standard will not drive inappropriate measures.

Forthcoming Legislation

- New Common Housing Standard (Draft Bill 2023; Bill in 2024/25)
- ► Heat in Buildings Strategy Regs for Homes to meet EPC C, by 2030
- ► EPC Reform
