Practicalities

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- Risk assessment
- Pool Safety operating Procedure (NOP, EAP)
- •Briefing organisations that hire the pool
- Reporting accidents
- Providing first aid
- Safety signage



General Maintenance



- •Cleanliness
- Heating ventilation & air conditioning systems
- •Fuel storage tanks
- Lighting
- Glazing
- Building safety separately





Water Treatment

- •COSHH
- Chemical handling
- •PPE
- Disinfection
- Waste disposal
- •Calcium hypochlorite, Sodium hypochlorite, chlorinated isocyanurates, ozone (main types)
- Monitoring
- Filtration
- Emergency procedures




Corporate H&S duties



Duty to "ensure" the health safety and welfare of employees

Duty to "ensure" the health and safety of non-employees



Corporate H&S duties



Duty to "ensure" the health safety and welfare of those who work within them



"So far as is reasonably practicable"

Corporate Manslaughter and Corporate Homicide Act 2007



- Prosecution must prove the way in which activities managed or organised:
 - Caused a person's death;
 - Amounts to a gross breach of a relevant duty of care owed to the deceased; and
 - Senior management's role in the breach was a substantial element in the breach

Penalties

- unlimited fine (multi-million);
- remedial order; and / or
- publicity order

- Part of Council
- Stand alone trust



Individual H&S duties




Individuals H&S duties

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Duty to take reasonable care of self and others affected by work (s.7)

Where an offence... has been committed with the consent, connivance, or...attributable to any neglect on the part of any director, manager ... or a person who purports to act in that capacity, he/she as well as the company shall be guilty of that offence (s.37)



Individuals H&S duties



- Fines / penalties
 - Section 7 £5,000
 - Section 37
 - Magistrates £20,000
 - Crown unlimited (typically £50k to £100k)
 - Imprisonment up to 2 years (or community service)
 - Directors disqualification for up to 15 years (typically 5 years)

Case Law









Case Law 1 (2009)



- 7 year old girl had hair sucked into a sampling outlet, saved by granddad
- Insufficient lifeguards, poor supervision, no pressure testing of sampling point
- Sec 3 HSWA duty
- £18,000 fine, £7,500 costs

Case Law 2 (2007)



- Drowning in wave channel
- Section 3 HSWA £40k

Case Law 3 (2011)



- Improvement Notice
- Inadequate risk control due to poor lighting
- Breaches under HSWA sec 2 & 3, Workplace HSW Regs

Case Law selection



- Severe head injuries from swing collapse due to poor maintenance (£18k fine, HSWA sec 3)
- Electric shock at skate park, vandalism not repaired (£5k fine, HSWA sec 3)
- 7 year old girl drowned (£90k fine, HSWA sec 3)
