Like every journey it starts with a clear vision, a plan, a map on how to reach your destination.

Liverpool City had:

22,000 properties adjacent to 4ft alleyways (weekly collection bagged waste)12,000 similar type properties

38,000 properties adjacent to 9ft alleyways (fortnightly wheeled bincollection point)

Terraced property areas typically recycled; 12% to 15% before the intervention

Compared to semi and detached properties which such as Knotty Ash 50:56%.



Costs up to £65.89 per property compared to £38.50 (semi or detached property)

Why was there a cost difference?




A Typical Terraced Street of 98 Houses

HMO / Students

Of the Privately Rented (PRS) – 59

- 31 (58%) are licensed HMO properties
- 27 properties have student exemptions
- 18 of which are HMO
- = Est 50% of all properties have at least 6 or greater residents



Estimated 635 people living in street; 57,150 ltrs waste @ 90ltrs generated per person each week.






The Difference



The existing designs of the properties and alleyways from the early 1900's did not make provision for waste storage and separation expectations that we have today. Waste was therefore uncontained and present throughout the week.



There were Safety Issues and Operational Concerns



The condition of many alleyways across the city is poor and infested with rats, flies and smells.. We had to do something...... but what



Residents; LSSL & LCC Staff at Risk



In 2016 reported injuries associated to working in the alleyways reached a staggering **SIX** cases; All a result of an unsafe work environment








Balancing common ground rules with customising the message

Programme Objectives / Benefits

- To improve the local environment for all residents by removing the storage of waste from alleyways
- To enable improved resident access to the alleyway and their homes
- To address resident concerns of rats, flies and smells from the alleyways
- To provide a safe working environment for collection and cleansing crews.
- To increase the City's recycling performance
- To develop an efficient, effective, sustainable and scalable waste collection service for properties adjacent to 4ft Alleyways.





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
