The issues

- Cost of living difficulties
- Recruitment issues
- Tiny differentials in pay
- Don't feel valued
- Lack of access to face-to-face training
- More complex needs to be met (food allergies)



Cost of living difficulties – reports from members

96% are concerned with the increased cost of living

46% have had to borrow money in the past year

17% have had to use a food bank

35% say they work more than their contracted hours – unpaid

62% say workload has increased in the past year

31% have at least one extra job



Pay and recruitment difficulties

- Supervisors/managers and cooks paid little more than kitchen assistants
- 41% are actively looking for a better-paid job
- 57% don't feel valued as a member of staff
- Staff shortages in a lot of kitchens
- Hours being cut to the minimum for staff



Allergies— reports from reps

Pupils have eaten school meals containing allergens leading to disciplinary investigations

- staff reported reduced hours/staff due to budgetary constraints
- increasing number of special dietary requirements
- lack of formal medical information
- less central support (from LA)
- formula used to calculate hours too blunt



How to make working lives better

- Better pay
- More hours/certainty of hours
- Being appreciated/acknowledged/noticed
- More resources for managing allergens
- Free school meals?
