Balance of core spending power 15/16 and 19/20: as RSG shrivels beyond London and the Mets, most LA funding will come from council tax

- 1. Government for the first time held most responsible for decline in Council services.

- 3. The public support Councils being given more funds to deal with climate change.

Key fact 3: Relative Trust in Councils high

Trust in Councils and Councillors is at it highest relative to Government and Ministers since 2016. Trust in Councils has moderately increased, trust in government and MPs has crashed while many distrust anyone.

<u>Seven and half times</u> as many people trust the local Council over the Government to make decisions about how services are delivered in your local area (Four times 2018).

<u>Eleven times</u> as many trust local Councillors over Government ministers to make decisions about their local area (Seven times 2018).

<u>Nine times</u> trusted Council to provide services in their local area over the government (Five times as many 2018).

<u>Five times</u> as many trusted Council to provide services in their local area over a private company (Four and a half 2018).


Climate Change now a priority for Councils

This year we undertook additional questions about Councils and climate change which show that it a priority for the public and they expect Councils to take a leading role in responding to climate change.


Five Key findings

- 1. <u>74%</u> expect that local communities will have to respond to the effects of climate change in their area.
- 2. <u>66%</u> support additional money for Councils to respond to climate change locally compared to 22% opposed.
- 3. Equal support for Councils being best placed to combat community effects of climate change with Government at 36% each.
- 4. <u>Top priorities</u> for local climate change action are making <u>homes more energy</u> <u>efficient</u> and <u>improved waste and recycling</u>.
- 5. <u>Climate change is the second highest new spending priority</u> after Social Care and ahead of Housing and Road Maintenance.


