






The COVID-effect!

- 86% feel parks have had their budgets cut more severely than other services (68% in 2021).
- 92% said budget cuts had led to reduced levels of maintenance and increases in unmaintained land (71% in 2021).
- 100% said lack of investments in parks and green spaces will impact adversely health and social well-being (97% in 2021).
- 94% stated parks should be free to access (96% in 2021).





Service Efficiencies


- Rethinking staffing levels/ multi-skilling
- Operational changes
- Shared procurement
- Increased commercialism
- Introducing new forms of land management
- Better location of staff to reduce travel costs
- Bringing services back in-house/greater flexibility
- Promotion of sponsorship and donation opportunities
- Asset transfer of land and buildings
- Decreasing subsidisation to services.
- Reducing service provision and standards
- Community management e.g. allotments.



Income generation

- **Main sources** of income generation are still:
- sports pitch lettings, allotments, cafes, events and festivals, franchises and fairgrounds.
- Other sources of income come from bowling greens, tennis courts, car parks, boot camps and golf courses,
- HLF Grants, S106 and monies raised by Friends
 Groups are also still an important source of additional income.
- A few respondents are also raising monies from Ecosystem services.
- Due to COVID, income was adversely affected, most areas are now beginning to recover, however, sponsorship is still slow to recover.








Do you think the number of visitors to your formal parks during the past year has:




Are you considering 'Rewilding' any of your parks or greenspaces?


Key Points: Trust and Satisfaction

- 3. Satisfaction levels with many specific services remain high, despite this year's challenges


Key Points: Current and future challenges

- 3. Climate change still a high priority, closely following affordable housing, social care, and road maintenance.


Enough of your taxes spent in your area?




Key fact 2 : People trust Councils with their tax
