
	Basic estimated statistics
7,439	Overall estimated number of ash trees on verges of A, B, C and U roads
855	Estimated number of ash trees in Council ownership (Roads) and within falling distance of the road
6,584	Estimated number of ash trees in private ownership and within falling distance of the Road
13,415	Estimated number of ash trees in Green Infrastructure adjacent public areas
38,608	Estimated number of recorded woodland ash trees
89%	of the recorded ash trees are 6 metres plus in size (the size that requires work to be undertaken to remove safety risks)


