
Sustainability and the Circular Economy





- Energy Crisis ~ 12p KWh to 32p KWh
- LED roll-outs continue approx. 65% of the UK now LED
- Central Management Systems (CMS) deployed to further reduce energy consumption via adaptive lighting strategies
- Right Light, Right Place, Right Time mantra
- Manufacturers increasingly looking to produce reusable, replaceable components— Circular Economy approach







Developing the profession





European Commissions ECOSLIGHT project identified shortage of lighting professionals

- Lack of sufficient and appropriately skilled resource available
- High staff turnover rates in a competitive marketplace
- Aging technically skilled workforce 'traditional lighting engineers' retiring
- No defined routes into the profession "I fell into lighting"
- Pace of technology, demands of society require continuous upskilling the role of the lighting professional has dramatically changed



Developing the profession





- I chose Lighting Campaign call to action to our members to promote and be proud of our profession
- Young Lighting Professionals (YLP) to retain and develop those early in career in lighting underpin all ILP
- Women Lighting Professionals (WLP) launched Jan 2024
- STEM engagement project working with local UTC's, schools, collages
- MoU reinforcing collaboration with other industry bodies Highways Electrical Association (HEA) and Lighting Industry Association (LIA) to directly tackle this issue together
- Strategic Implementation Project to encourage and support new talent into the industry – Pathways into Lighting

Smart Safer Cities





- Ever changing technology & societal expectation for improved more connected services
- Provision of ever-widening services via street lighting architecture
 - CCTV
 - IOT devices
 - EV charging infrastructure
- Skills and competences required beyond basic lighting competency. Pressure felt by asset owners to provide these services from existing lighting assets –




