Remobilisation Report - Highways

- APSE has undertaken remobilisation reports for each of the frontline service
- These reports have been complied with the input of local authorities services from across the UK
- Involving an initial scoping report followed by more indepth discussions covering 4 key areas:-
 - Budget, Finance & re-establishing commercial activity
 - Operational activity
 - Re-grouping the workforce
 - Technical issues



Remobilisation Report - Highways

- Within Scotland it was recorded through discussions that roads maintenance operations had been restricted to those considered to be safety critical.
- With authorities using the Scottish Government guidance published on 6th April for constructions sites & associated works to inform local assessments
- Following the initial scoping discussing it was agreed that the remobilisation for Highways would involve:-
 - Supply of blacktop and aggregate
 - Contract rescheduling
 - Operational staff & safe operating practices
 - Vehicles & equipment



Recommencing Supply

- Most blacktop plant was scaled back or shut as demand dried up.
- Most are phasing re-opening so contact will need to be made to obtain accurate schedules of available materials.
- Demand initially could be high as contractors attempt to 'catch-up' and some may have furloughed staff awaiting a judgement on the most economically advantageous time to bring them back.
- Some councils have used cold-lay products as a temporary measure on potholes.

- Few supply chain issues
