Scottish Borders COUNCIL

Area

- 6th largest local authority in Scotland
- 4,732sq km

Population density

- Ranked 7th least populated local authority in Scotland
- 24 people per sq km



Service Provision



Kerbside Collection Service (2013/14)

Collection Type	Capacity	Frequency	Coverage	
Residual Waste	180 litre	AWC	100%	
Dry Mixed Recyclate (DMR)	240 litre	AWC	100%	
Garden Waste	180 litre	AWC - Mar to Nov 4 Weekly - Dec to Feb	~38,000 h/hlds Just urban areas (within 30mph limits)	

Service Provision



Garden Waste Tonnage:

Source	Annual Tonnage
Kerbside	6,000
Community Recycling Centre	2,000
Parks Department	600
Total	8,600

Large contribution towards household recycling rate i.e. 6%

Costs £610,000 per annum to provide

Service Provision



- Rural areas consistently raised equality issues
- Pressure to expand service to rural areas
- High customer satisfaction levels
- Service well liked by residents
- Not a statutory service
- Council required to bridge £28 million p.a. budget deficit by 2017/18



GARDEN WASTE REVIEW

Options Considered



- 1. Status Quo
- 2. Withdrawal of the service
- 3. Charged for service in urban areas
- 4. Charged for service to the whole of the Borders
- 5. Co-mingled collection with food waste

Key reasons for withdrawing Service



- No statutory requirement to provide the service
- 4 out of 9 rural local authorities do not provide a kerbside service
- One third of households in the Borders did not receive the service
- Potential £450k per annum saving
- It will help protect other key statutory services provided by the Council

Key reasons for withdrawing Service



- Additional financial pressure of providing food waste collections
- Alternative disposal options:
 - Home composter available to all affected households
 - Improved access to Network of Community Recycling Centres to be increased
 - Capital investment in existing CRC
 - As a last resort garden waste can be put in residual bin



COMMUNICATION CAMPAIGN



- Householder Leaflet/Guidance
- Issued to all affected households

IMPACTS OF REMOVING THE SERVICE

Impacts



3,500 compost bins issued free of charge

 5 private sector organisations set up to provide kerbside garden waste collections Services.


Garden Waste Displacement



- Anticipated garden waste displacement:
 - 50% Composted at home or lost from the system
 - 35% Taken to Community Recycling Centres
 - 15% Put into the general waste bin
- Estimated household recycling rate will reduce by 6%


Impact on CRC's






Impact on Household Waste to Landfill





Impact on Recycling Performance






Impact on Satisfaction Levels





"This has been a very difficult decision for the council to make"

Scottish Borders Council have revealed plans to stop collections of garden waste.

The local authority hope to save £450,000 a year by stopping their garden waste sentre.

They have also revealed proposals to provide food waste bins to a number of Border towns, and there are plans to open a recycling centre in Kelso.

The plans go before councillors next week.



Challenges



- The Green Bin Petition 7,675 signatories
- Main issues:
 - Recycling centres failed to cope with increased demand
 - Service withdrawn before new Kelso CRC developed
 - Anecdotal evidence of increased fly tipping
 - Increased car movement s
 - No consultation
- Discussed at Petitions Committee on 23 October 2014

Challenges



- Garden Waste Motion proposed at Council 30 October 2014 requesting:
 - Letter to be issued to all Rural Community Council's outlining support available
 - Discuss options to work with 'Resilient Communities'
 - Develop specific webpage to raise awareness of private sector contractors providing a garden waste collection service.
 - Further communication.
- Update on Garden Waste Motion presented to Council on 2 April 2015.





- The decision to withdraw the service remain sound:
 - Non-Statutory Service
 - £450k per annum saving
 - Helped to protect other key services
- Our estimated displacement figures were surprisingly accurate
- Recycling performance reduced significantly



- Satisfaction levels reduced
- We didn't cope with the increased throughput at CRC's:
 - Not enough capacity
 - Poor site design
 - Staff moral impacted by negative feedback
 - Increased complaints regarding service
- The private sector are likely to fill the gap in the market



Advice if you are considering withdrawing your Garden Waste Service:

- Ensure you undertake a detailed public consultation prior to taking any decisions
- Do not under estimate how much the public like the garden waste service
- Invest in your CRCs before removal of the service
- Ensure you have a detailed communication campaign
- Expect your customer satisfaction levels to reduce

Drivers for Change & Decisions



December 2013 – Council Approved:


- Integrated Waste Management Strategy
- New Community Recycling Centre (CRC) to be developed
- Review of CRC trade waste policy
- Review of CRC locations, opening times and layout
- Food waste service to be implemented from summer 2015
- Removal of kerbside garden waste collection service 31 Mar 14



2013/14 Scottish Local Authority Context

Type of Garden Waste Service	Number of Local Authorities
Separate kerbside collection	19
Co-mingled food and garden collection	8
Do not provide a kerbside collection	5



- Approx 25% of Local Authorities charge
- Average charge was £25/yr, with a maximum of £70/yr




Review of LA's in England Charging for Garden Waste in 2013

- Sample size = 23 Councils in England
- Average charge = ~£35/yr
- Average participation rate = ~25% (only 14 Councils able to provide info)





Charged for Service vs. Participation



Unable to achieve 10% participation rate at proposed charges (i.e. £77.60/yr and £146.55/yr).

Removing the Garden Waste Service



Reaction so far:

- Negative press coverage
- 6 official complaints
- 140 enquiries
- 2,754 compost bin requests
- 2,600 compost bins delivered
- 5,275 ASK Organics website hits in April 2014
- Private sector interest in providing kerbside service has been good
- Increased usage at Community Recycling Centres
- Increase in requests for second residual waste bins

Removing the Garden Waste Service



Outstanding Actions:

- Collecting unwanted garden waste bins
- Storing garden waste bins
- CRC Trade Waste Policy
- Upgrading CRCs
- Development of new CRC

Integrated Waste Management Strategy



Aims

- To ensure that the waste services delivered by the Council are 'fit for purpose' and financially sustainable in the long term.
- To provide clear strategic direction for municipal waste management in the Borders through to 2025.
- To guide future decision-making.
- One of the proposals was to withdraw the kerbside collection of garden waste.
