- Crowd funding











the THE HESCO GARDEN 2010



Following the success of the HESCO Garden in 2009, Leeds City Council returned to the RHS Chelsea Flower Show in 2010 with its most ambitious garden design to date!

Teaming up once again with HESCO Bustion, the theme of the 2010 garden is the celebration of the green linkages of the Parks and Greenspaces of Leeds. It also stresses the importance these areas play in improving the health and well being of the people who visit the

The garden design redfu a sturring mapshot of the greenpace of Leech with distinctive woodland, wedand and floral meadow. These flank the important enterpiece of the garden, a section of canal and lode gate found on the scoucic lessed-laverpool canal. The design trues locally sourced Yorkshize materials combined with plane also found in the region. The shalls which went into creating the garden die only benefit the people of Leefa at these techniques are used to improve the look and quality of green paces arous the city.

All the hard work which went in to creating this stunning garden paid off when it was awarded a gold medal at the 2010 show

Aims to protect, preserve and enhance the parks, green spaces and other green infrastructure of Leeds

A closer look at the fund: aims

To improve publicly accessible parks and green spaces in the city boundaries of Leeds

'Improvements' defined by Green Flag criteria

Priorities:

- To fulfil the aspiration for all 63 community parks in Leeds to meet the Green Flag criteria (Leeds parks and Green Spaces Strategy)
- To 'improve the quality of life for Leeds residents, particularly for those who are vulnerable or in poverty' and 'to create a city of opportunity for all'.

Not a substitute for local authority funding - should add value



A closer look at the fund: What might be funded

Planting or improving horticultural features

Play equipment, skate parks, teen shelters

Access improvements

Improvements to heritage features such as bandstands

Signage and interpretation

Sports facilities e.g. tennis courts or bowling greens

Nature conservation

Education, knowledge and skill development e.g. apprentices

Support for *Friends of* groups

Funds revenue as well as capital Local authority can apply







A closer look at the Fund


Why would people donate?

Individuals:

- To give something back to a park or green space that means a lot to them (through a legacy)
- To remember a loved one
- To improve their local area
- To contribute to a project they are keen to see happen

Private Companies:

- Philanthropy
- To improve local area for staff
- To demonstrate corporate social responsibility
- Building partnerships with public/third/community sector



The practicalities of the Fund

Who manages the fund?

Management and distribution of donations and funds overseen by Leeds Community Foundation.

A panel will administer any funds raised. It will be made up of representatives from:

- Leeds Parks and Green spaces forum
- Leeds Community Foundation
- Leeds City Council (officers & members)
- (Ideally) Local business

How would people donate?

Cheques

In cash at events/in visitor centres

Bank transfer

On-line through website

Legacies in wills

Donations might be:

- Generic (e.g. 'to improve green space in Leeds')
- Specific (to a particular location or project).

Specific donations will require agreement with the landowner.

How would funding be administered?

Grant application process for allocation of generic funds.

Funding for specific projects allocated through value for money process

Endowments to be agreed with landowner
