### What would a Snow Warden do?

- Help deal with potential heavy snow fall and ice between October and April
- Report the latest local area conditions during wintry weather using the County Council's website
- Co-ordinate volunteers to clear snow and distribute grit
- Identify an individual who has authority to order the refilling of grit bins on behalf of the town or parish council - this may or may not be the snow warden
- Report situations that affect vulnerable residents, such as the elderly or infirm



## What would Derbyshire County Council provide?

- A free delivery of up to a tonne of paletted 20kg bags of salt for each town and parish council participating in the scheme
- Training in safe operations for the clearing of snow and ice from pavements and footways
- A website facility to report snow clearing activities and notify the Council of any problems/issues in the local area
- Early notification of severe weather



## What about the District and Borough Councils?

- High Peak and Chesterfield Borough Councils operate their own Snow Warden Scheme
- Members of the Borough Councils agree to undertake snow clearing activity
- DCC provide bagged grit to the Boroughs in order to operate this scheme

- Follow the Government Snow Code
- To date there have been no claims

#### **Snow Code**

There's no law stopping you from clearing snow and ice on the pavement outside your home or from public spaces. So it's unlikely you'd be sued or held legally responsible if someone was injured on the path if you clear it carefully.
