PROJECT OVERVIEW



Project Targets

- Two year long education and awareness projects:
 - Encourage reuse
 - Increase recycling activity by 2%
 - Reduce volumes of WEEE in the waste stream by 0.5% & 1%
 - Improve public attitudes towards WEEE reuse and recycling

In 2018 we added a further objective:

Increase battery recycling tonnages by 10%

PROJECT OVERVIEW



- Education and awareness project:
 - Employment of a dedicated educational resource to:-
 - Improve public education and behaviours towards WEEE and battery reuse and recycling
 - Encourage reduction, reuse and recycling
 - Reduce volumes of WEEE & batteries in the waste stream
 - Increase recycling activity
 - Minimise the risks to the infrastructure

What can I do with my old electrical appliances?

Reduce:

Do you really need the latest product? Does the old one still work?

Reuse:

Could you give it to a charity or a friend? Can it be repaired? If you must dispose of items then recycle the correct way.

Recycle:

Some small appliances can be recycled in your blue bin. You can recycle ALL electronic waste at your Household Waste and Recycling Centre.

2016 OUTCOMES



- WEEE recycling increased 9.6%
- 211 events were delivered
- 11,000 engagements took place
- 26% rise in battery recycling
- 1.6% overall reduction in residual waste:-

 - South Tyneside ↓ 5.1%
 - Sunderland 1 6.2%
- WEEE collections increased by 293 tonnes
- Reuse doubled
- •£100,000 was saved

SUSTAINABILITY



- Hopefully more funding
- Visitor and Education Centre Programme
- Phased cultural change
