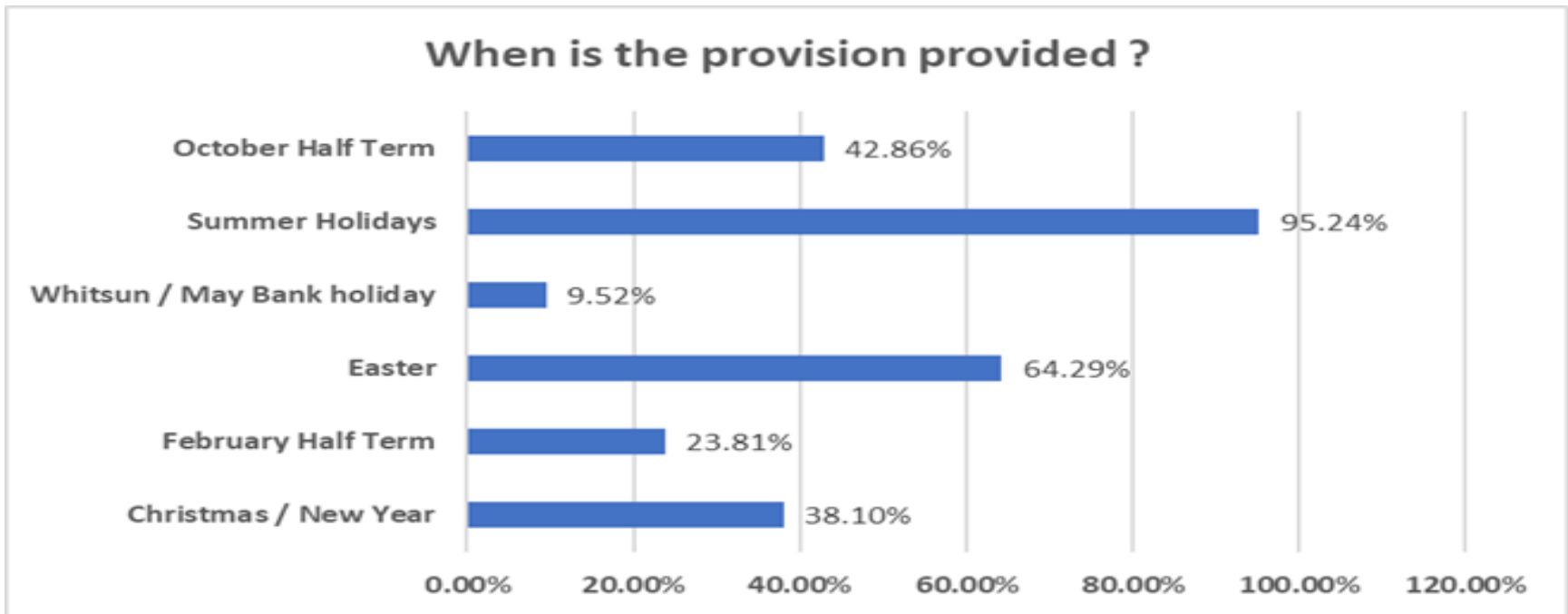


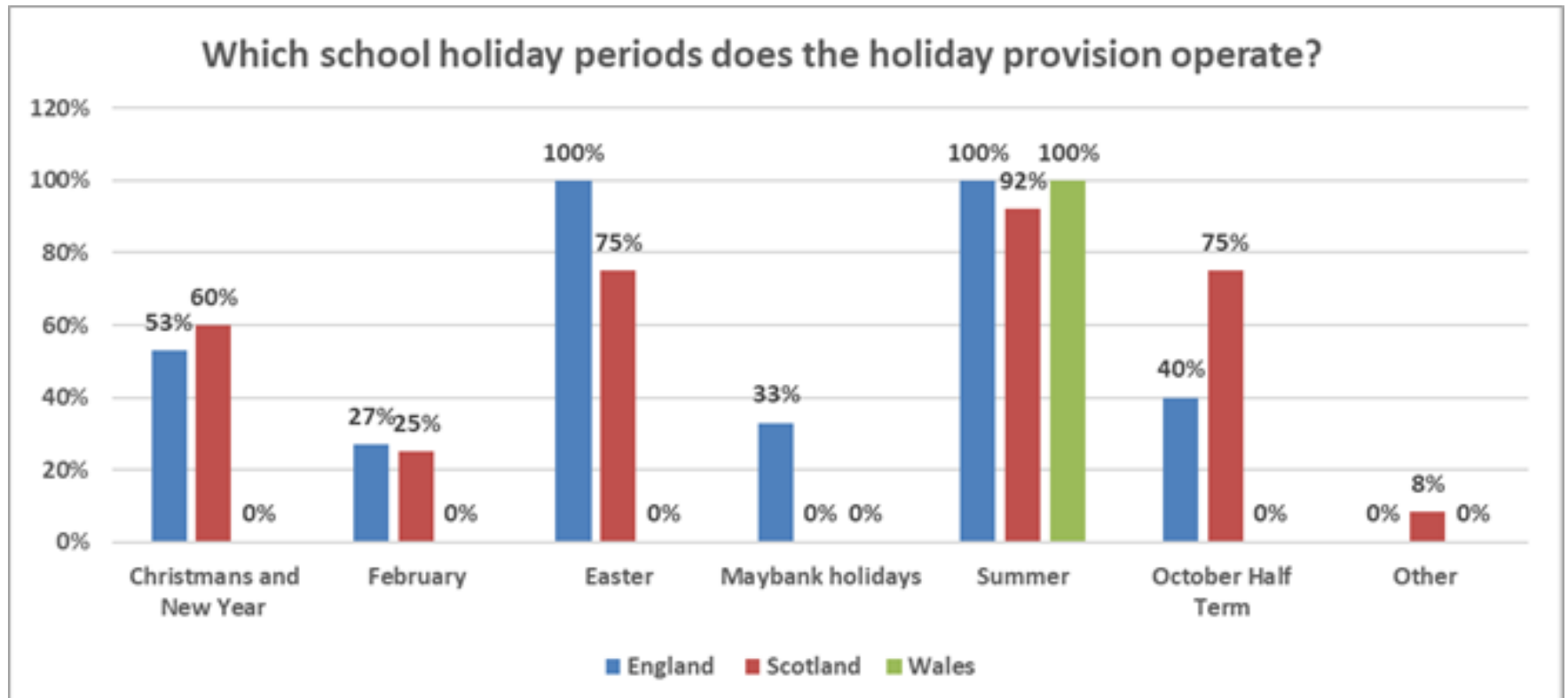

# When is the provision provided?



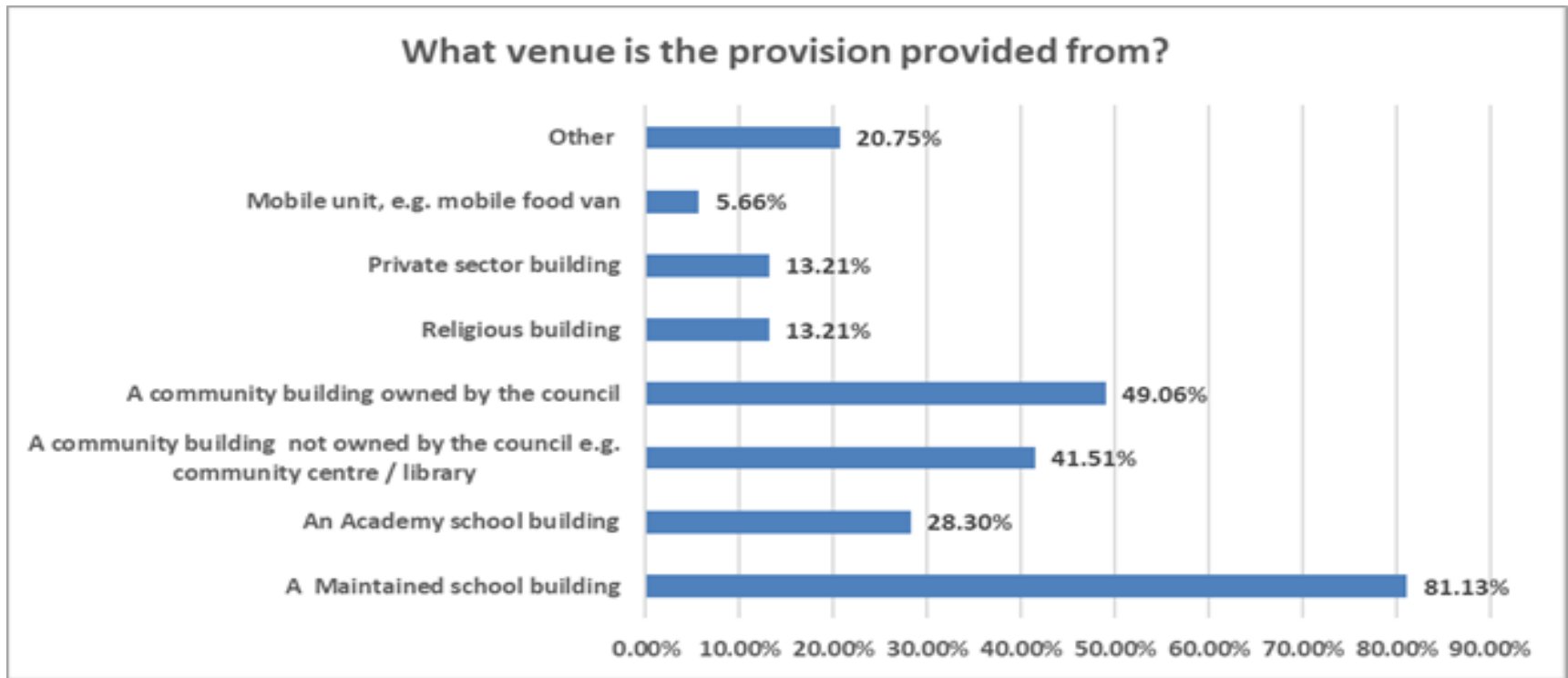
# UK breakdown



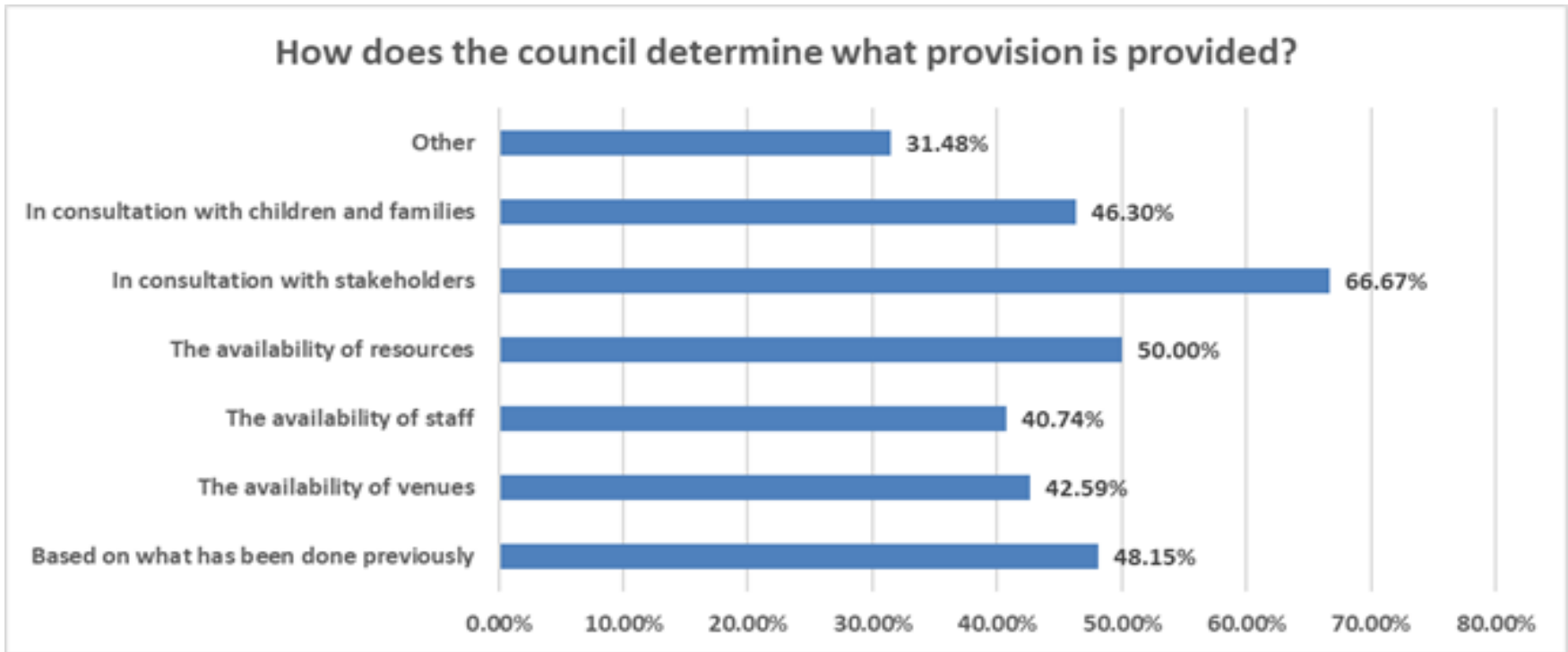
# Prior to 2021

- 17.31% - last year
- 40.38% - last 1 to 4 years
- 32.69% - last 4 to 7 years
- 5.77% - more than 7 years
- 5.77% - more than 10 years

# Type of provision

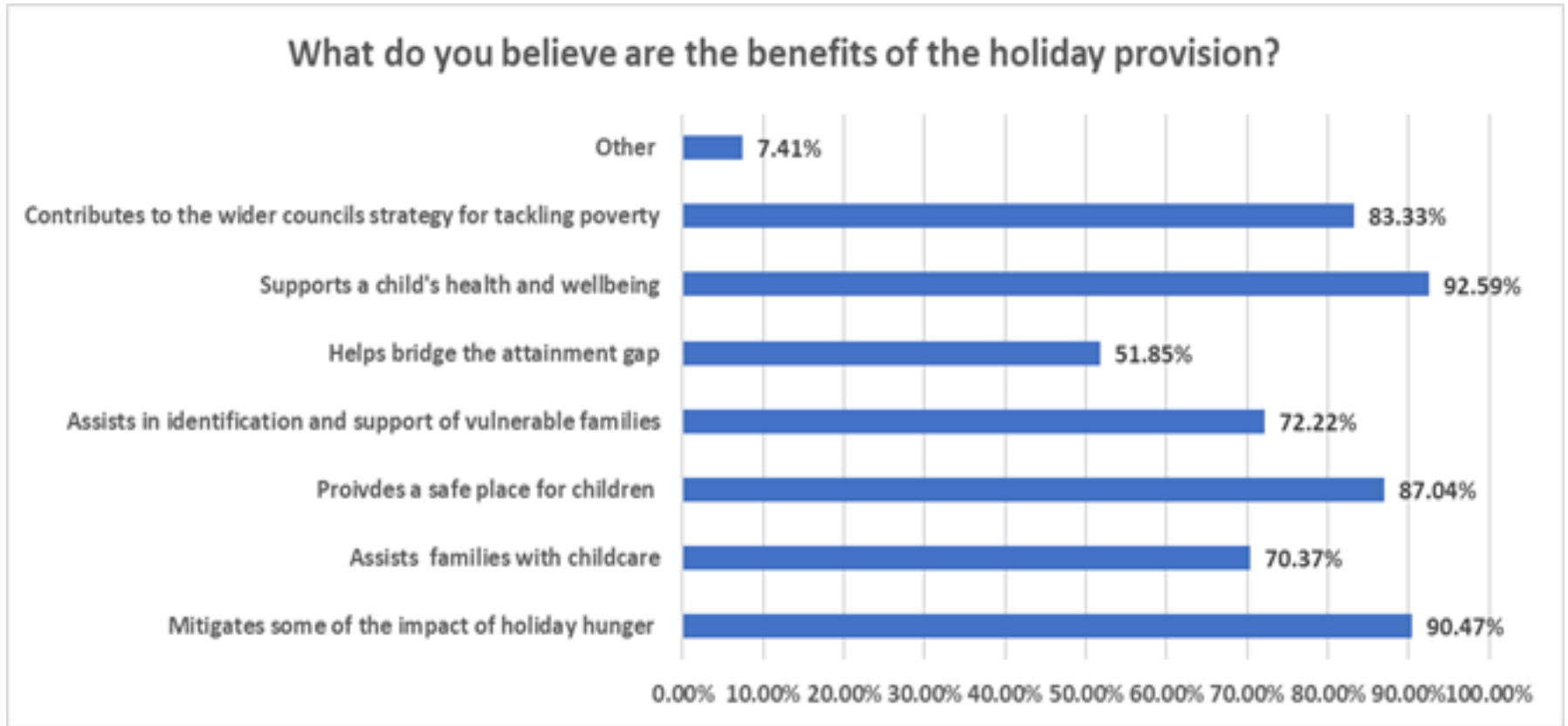
## Food

- 66.04% - hot lunchtime meal
- 45.25% - cold lunchtime meal
- 32.08% - breakfast

## Activities

- 75.93% - Indoor activities
- 75.93% - Outdoor activities
- 55.56% - Family activities
- 44.44% - Food only
- 35.19% - Educational activities

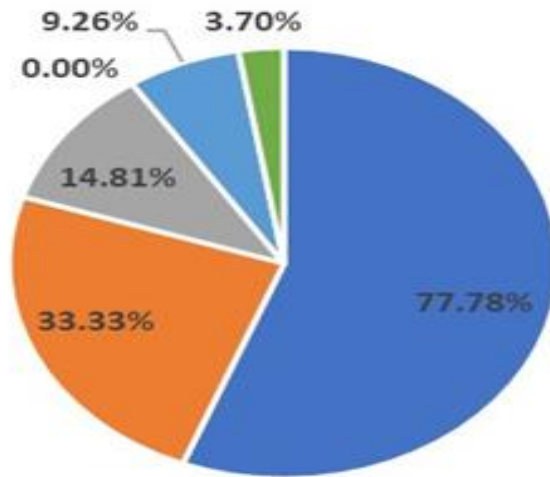

# How is provision funded?

How is the provision funded?



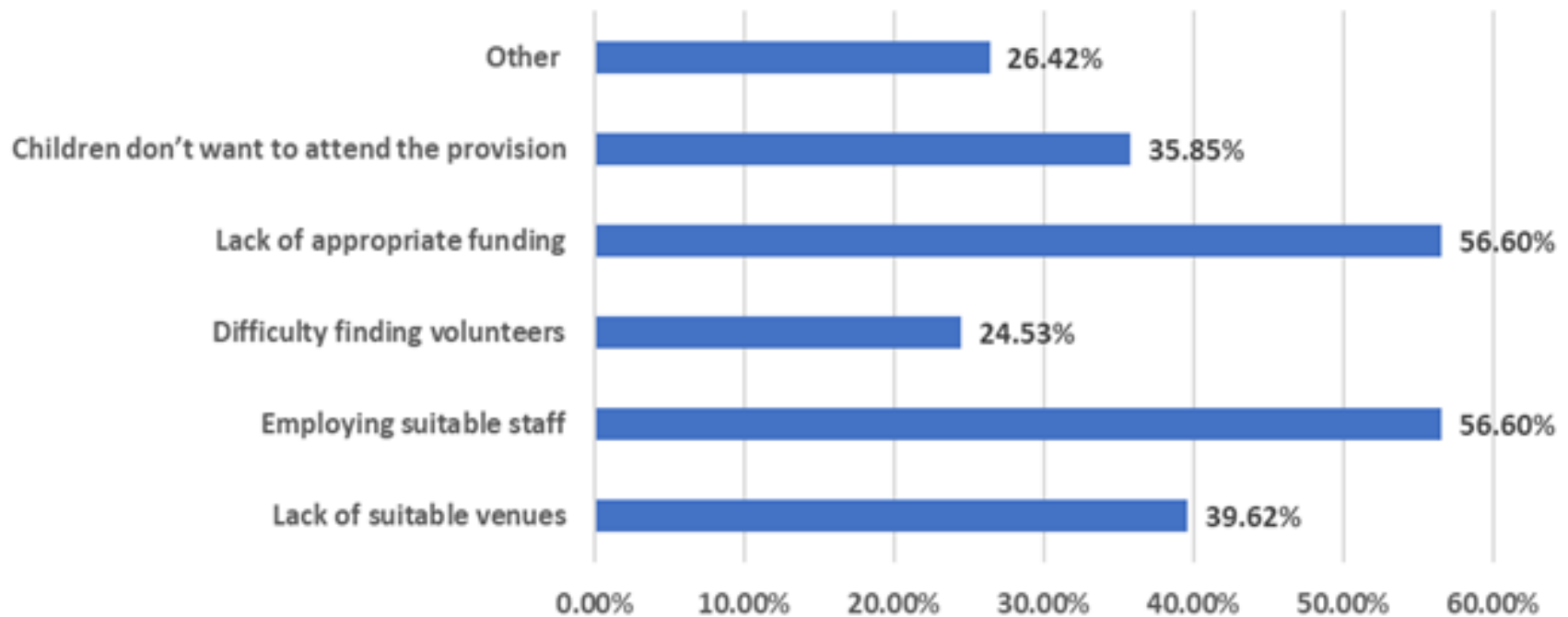
- Government Grant
- Council subsidy to supplement grant funding
- Wholly funded by the council
- Funded by a school / academy
- Funded by a community group / charity
- Private sector sponsorship / funding

# How is provision staffed?

- 81.48% - permanent members of staff employed by the council
- 48.15% - employed on temporary contracts specifically for the holiday provision
- 40.74% volunteers

# Conclusions

- Provision is wider than just providing food
- There are wide ranging benefits
- Local authorities have been providing holiday provision for sometime
- More lead time is required
- Holiday provision is a short-term stop gap
