# Show me the evidence!

## Evidencing impact of neighbourhood services

- The evidence is out there – it doesn't have to be produced locally: draw on other people's learning. If something contributes to a bigger outcome elsewhere, it will do locally – if the quality is right!
- Measuring the amount of impact locally – quantity and quality

## Making the complex simple

- Visual and accessible – borrowing logic modelling from Public Health

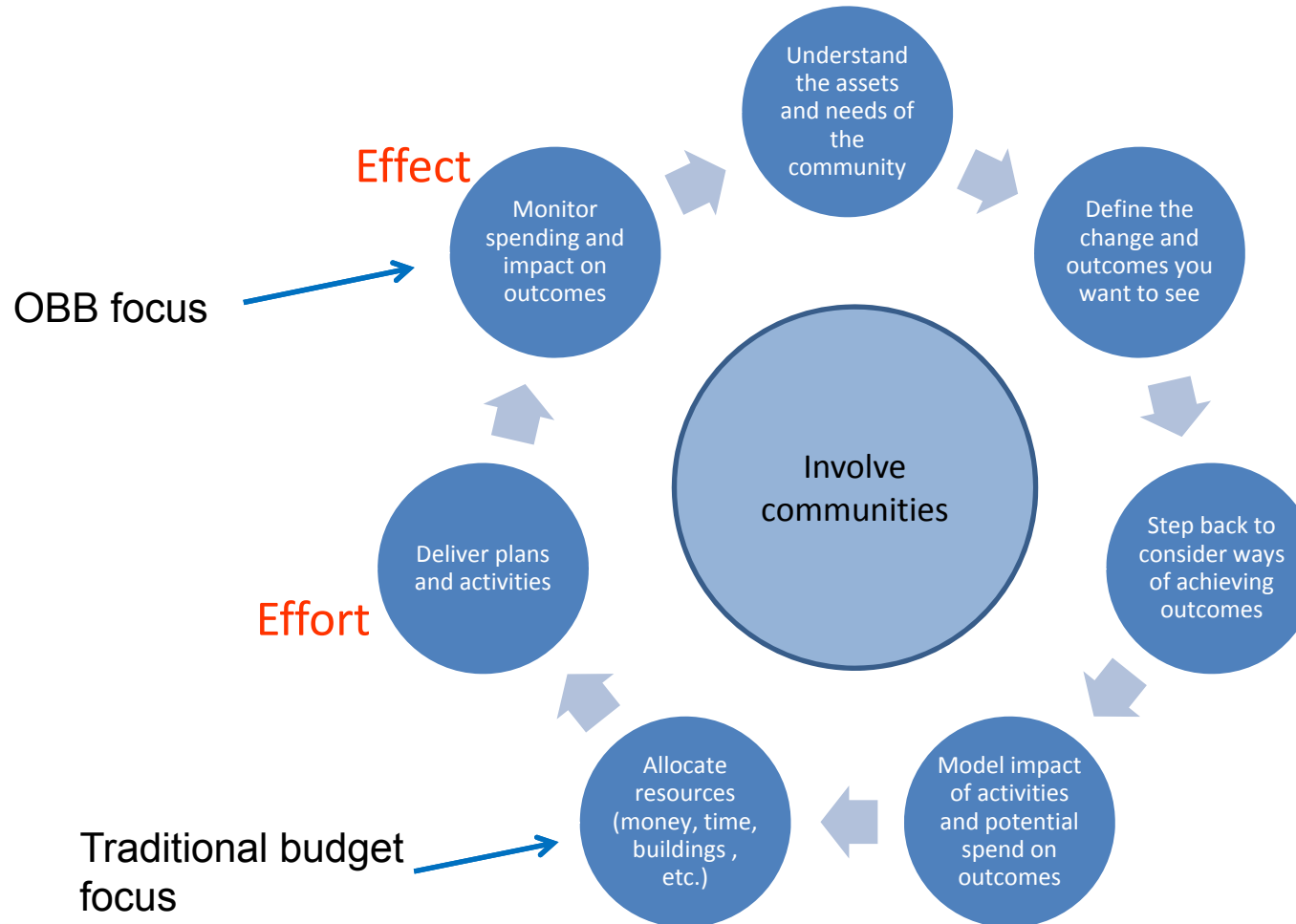
# Case study: harnessing the benefits of Idea Stores

- High level of footfall & high level of customer satisfaction
- Widening the impact of customer contact to more explicitly support corporate outcomes:
  - integration of numeracy and employment skills into all ESOL courses from pre-qualification level
  - digital inclusion through facilitated self-service access to transactional council services
  - fostering skills and community resilience through structured volunteering
- Comprehensive logic modelling to test all aspects of the service for their contribution to corporate outcomes
- Next: introduction of new outcome based accountability framework to continually measure impact effectively

# Outcomes Based Budgeting

Developing budgets based on the relationship between funding (Resources) and the difference spending is expected to make to the quality of life of our communities (Outcomes).

# Case study: prioritising investment in open space

- Rapidly growing population
- Limited capital and revenue resource to invest in open space
- Prioritisation framework:
  - areas of high growth and high density with limited access to private outdoor space
  - areas of low level of physical activity
  - design that encourages physical activity and offers climate change and air quality mitigation
